The gathering also provided the opportunity to make known to students the life and work of Fr. Patrick Peyton, CSC. In addition, it gave the opportunity for young people there present to know a little more about





our Congregation of Holy Cross, through the presence of members who shared with them in the celebration on this occasion, to encourage vocations for the Congregation

COME AND SEE PROGRAM



Some 15 young men had been invited to come to St. John's School, Sekondi, to participate in a "Come and See" program on the weekend that had begun with the celebration by our Holy

Cross family on the Solemnity of St. Joseph. These had been selected by Bro. Kenneth Goode, who is the vocation Director, from

Director, from information received in whatever way by these who had indicated their interest in attending the program. Of the 15 invited, there were actually 12 young men who did come.



They had the experience of fully sharing in the celebration on Friday evening, and on the following day they visited several of our Holy Cross houses in the Sekondi-Takoradi area, and shared in the scheduled group discussions with certain of our Ghanaian Brothers about various aspects of the religious life, and their meaning for those who live in community as a Brother of Holy Cross. Certain practical considerations were made in their own regard as to how one becomes aware that the Call is specifically given to them, expenses involved initially in their formation needs, etc. To enter the Candidacy Program, which is prior to their entry into the pre-novitiate, the applicant must have attained a high school diploma, as a general policy.

The program seemed to be well-received by all who had come. **Bro. Vincent Ntsiful** assists Bro. Kenneth, being generally assigned to vocational work in the Central Region in Ghana, with all else in the jurisdiction of Bro. Kenneth.

ST. JOHN'S SCHOOL - SEKONDI SIXTH FOUNDERS' DAY CELEBRATION

On 27th February 2010 St. John's celebrated its Sixth Founder's Day on which day, the occasion also including a Speech and Awards Day, the latter being a high point in the celebration with many students being awarded for accomplishments in respective areas of academic excellence and/or other noteworthy contributions in the life of the school. The occasion is always well attended by "Old Saints" (alumni) and friends of St. John's to whom **Bro. Joseph Annan, Headmaster,** gave his special welcome as "members of our family home". Also present were many Holy Cross community, some who are Old Saints of the school, many distinguished persons in areas of Education in the Western Region, Heads of institutions, members of the Press, along with staff and students of St. John's.

The theme for the Founder's Day celebration was "Stability In Education Policy in Ghana, A Pre-requisite for National Development."

In his Welcoming Address, Bro. Joseph alluded to the renown that the school has in the Western region, which is considered by many educators in the region as being one of the best, as supported by the competitive National Exams. Regarding the latter, the performance of St. John's students on the WASSCE2008/09 national exam, showed a significant, steady improvement with 95.5% passing, and two-thirds of its candidates qualified for admission into tertiary institutions. The aim is to have the seniors score 100% in all subjects and to qualify for admission into tertiary institutions from 2011 onwards.



On a different tack, Bro. Joseph voiced his criticism of the "powers that be", who do not take seriously the criticisms, suggestions and recommendations from the Heads of institutions. It is the latter, who implement the worthy goals of education in Ghana, but who at various educational forums have their recommendations, substantive of worth, treated with little value, if not disdain. Relating to this, Bro. Joseph strongly noted that St. John's could not

admit even a single student if no additional classrooms, dormitory blocks and other related accommodation spaces are provided by the Educational Ministry owing to lack of infrastructure for 2010/11 academic year and beyond, which has been presented to the government but for which nothing seems to be done. Bro. Joseph expressly stated, "We cannot continue to manage and be innovative as they always

want us to do when there are so many restrictions. In fact it seems imminent that Heads of institutions will break down if government does nothing about this situation...The challenge becomes even more (demanding) when Heads of second cycle institutions are told to run their schools on fees fixed in 2006/2007 academic year, which is 4 years ago. Has nothing changed in the past 3 or 4 years?"



In his concluding remarks, Bro. Joseph made a "passionate appeal" to Old Saints to consider reactivating and restoring the defunct Alumni Office, expressed his hope that "together we shall achieve greatness."

Then followed the guest speaker's reflection on the special

significance of this day for all there present and for the local community, as well. Then after the speech by



the Senior Prefect, various awards were given by the **Bro. Daniel Dardoe, District Superior**, presiding.

The occasion began earlier in the morning with the Saints Color Guard/Cadet Corps, who performed with precision their



marching and especially, "Passing-in-Review" before the visiting dignitaries. The Cadet Corps is "influenced" to some degree by the fact of the locally based navy in Takoradi, thus encouraging their adoption of the white navy uniforms. In most other schools the cadet corps wear a more familiar olive

green of the army

At the end of the program a social at which food and drinks were served

allowed a further opportunity for Old Saints, especially, to renew friendships and exchange memorable events of their unfolding lives in their days at St. John's, as well as with former teachers still at hand to whom they owe their formative years in education at the school.
